Financial

Our snow removal costs will, for the second year in a row, exceed not only our budget projection but also last year's record expenditure of \$84,000. To provide some perspective – in Fiscal Years 2010-2014, the average was \$25,213 with a low of \$1,095 in 2012. It is projected that our Fiscal Year 2015-2016 snow removal cost will be close to \$92,000. Obviously the Board through yearly bids is always looking for cost savings in this area. The Board is very appreciative of all the positive comments it received regarding the snow removal effort. Any damage to mailboxes, grass areas, asphalt and curbs is being addressed by our vendor. All other areas of the budget appear to be at or under forecasts through the first seven months. At the February Board of Directors meeting, the Board received the final audit for last year.

Budget

The Budget & Finance Committee is in the process of reviewing first drafts of the 2017 fiscal year budget. The final budget will be mailed to the membership around June 1, 2016. The landscaping contract has been bid out and four vendors have responded. The Board will award the final contract along with the LMA contract so one vendor will be selected for all the LMA including the LMROA. The audit of LMROA financials, which was performed by the Goldklang Group CPA's, received their highest rating for the third year in a row.

Stonewall Entrance Improvement

The Board has established a budget using the Basheer Funds and is investigating a "resident only" lane. If the cost of a resident lane is not feasible then a two lane configuration similar to the Amsterdam Gate will be pursued. In all cases the appearance of the Amsterdam Gate will be the guide from an appearance standpoint. Complete details of the February meeting can be read in a separate article in this issue.

Pool/Swim & Tennis Center

All repairs to the electrical conduit to the lights on the pool deck and water lines at the onsite office have been made with the water line being relocated underground to correct and eliminate future problems and exposure.

Communications Committee

Ed Davidson is moving to South Carolina, and Dick LaFrance has been appointed by the Board as his replacement as Committee Chair. Ed and the Committee did a great job! One of Dick and the Committee's first tasks will be to establish a new website for the Community. This new website should help make issues, solutions and information easier to communicate to the Community. Covenants Administrator

Shelly Friend has taken a full time job with CMC as the Front Desk Supervisor for another community. CMC is currently interviewing candidates for this position and should have a new Covenants Administrator in place very soon.

The following is a summary of the LMROA Town Hall Meeting conducted on Tuesday, January 12, 2016 at the Stonewall Golf Club. The meeting was attended by an estimated 180 residents. The purpose of the meeting following presentations was to answer questions and listen to resident comments and recommendations regarding the planned Stonewall Entrance Improvement Project. Town Hall Meeting was facilitated by Sara Ross, LMROA Legal Counsel/Moderator.

LMROA Financial Posture - Jack Boyle

- Chair, Budget & Finance Committee provided a detail report on the financial picture of the LMROA including the Reserve Fund/Study:
 - Required every 5 years; study scheduled In 2016
- · Operating Budget:
 - · Yearly operating expense to operate the Association seems very manageable.
- · Basheer Settlement Fund:
 - Will pay LMROA \$550K when all 70 units in the development are sold.
 - Presently LMROA has been paid \$334K; spent \$214K; have \$120K left from the Project.

History of Basheer Town Home Project - Errol Unikel

- Provided a History of the Basheer Project
 - \$550K to LMROA from Basheer Town House Project.
 - · Security and visitor access were original issues.
 - LM Stonewall was the only community in the region without a resident access lane.
 - Improving LM Stonewall for \$256K rejected by community; required special assessment.
 - Instead the community favored improving the Community as a whole to include Amsterdam and Stonewall Entrances.

<u>Stonewall Entrance Improvement Project Options – Joe</u> <u>Greenlee/Marc Schlather</u>

- JG provided attendees with Entrance Committee options two & three lane options.
- MS provided alternate two-lane option for the Board's consideration.

Resident Question/Comment Period

- Majority of resident's comments wanted the Board to make a decision and move forward with entrance improvements.
- Community should vote to approve the project versus the Board making the decision.
- Is there money in the Basheer Fund to fund the project without an assessment? Yes.
- Is there an issue with Baltusrol Gate's third lane being closed?
 Reason less traffic; no issue.
- Short sighted by not improving Stonewall entrance when constructing the Community; resident entrance would improve property values.

- Felt the developer of the Community made a mistake by not putting in a third lane; we should move forward now.
- Association should better understand Reserve Fund and Operating Budget expenditures before spending money on Stonewall Entrance Improvement Project. Sale of Town Homes is slow
- Board makes decisions with the best interest of the Community at the forefront of their decision process.
- Regarding the Western Peninsula survey; Community should give those on the Western side the opportunity for equity and self-determination.
- Other Communities in the Region seem to do a much better job of managing visitor access.
- From a realtor's perspective having a third lane would not only facilitate access but improve property values; it is embarrassing having to wait for visitor checks when you are a resident and have a client.
- Safety is an issue but shouldn't be the primary factor in making a decision.
- One final questionnaire was encouraged

Pool Opening.

Preparations will soon be underway for pool opening. The pool will open for the season on Saturday, May 28th. Remember, you should continue to use the electronic key cards issued to you from previous pool seasons. If you cannot locate your card, or need additional cards, you may purchase them for \$50 each at the Swim and Tennis Center office. New residents will receive two electronic key cards at no charge. You may pick up pool key cards at the site office Monday through Friday between the hours of 10 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. or by appointment – just give us a call and we will do our best to accommodate you.

Covenants and Inspections.

After three years at Lake Manassas, Shelly Friend, our Covenants Administrator, accepted a full-time position with another nearby community and left us at the beginning of March. Good luck, Shelly and thank you for your years of service to the community! By the time you receive this news magazine, our new Covenants Administrator should be in place and ready to begin annual inspections.

Understandably over the winter months some exterior maintenance could not be performed. If you have not already done so, please take a few minutes to inspect the exterior of your home and identify anything that needs correction such as peeling or splintering paint, power washing or lawn and yard maintenance. We will be performing annual inspections at all properties over the course of the next few months and will send letters to residents whose homes may need some "sprucing up." Please contact me if you receive a letter and feel it was sent in error, or if you find you need a short extension of time to complete a project.

COURTEOUS NEIGHBORS:

Please do not walk on private property which includes residents' lawns and the golf course. Please keep children and animals off the golf course. Golfers retrieving golf balls are allowed to walk in the resident's yards that back up on the golf course.

Although on street parking is not permitted in Lake Manassas, we do understand there are occasions when temporary parking on the street may be necessary, for example, children's birthday parties and holiday dinners. Please make every effort to have your guests park in your empty driveway spaces first.

Noise Ordinance Times: The Prince William County noise ordinance is Monday through Friday from 10 pm until 6 am and on Saturday, Sunday and Holidays from 10 pm until 9 am. If you were to contact the police regarding what you consider to be an inappropriate time for unusually loud noises, they will come out and investigate. But first, speak to your neighbors to explain that the noise is disturbing to you.

Complaints: The onsite office regularly receives complaints on a variety of topics that most recently include:

- Cigarette butts disposed of improperly on the street and/or on private property;
- Dogs barking and biting; Pets off leash and/or roaming and defecating on private property;
- Neighbor's lawns not mowed or weeded properly;
- · Speeding;
- Vehicles running stop signs;
- RV's and/or boats brought into the community and left overnight and/ or parked in dangerously in the street.

Management will address these issues as they arise, however we thank you in advance for following the County laws as well as the community rules and being a considerate neighbor.

continually disregard the parking regulations, you may be called to a hearing before the Covenants Committee and fined for each infraction.

COMMUNITY SAFETY:

Please drive slowly and use caution as you drive through the community keeping an eye out for pedestrians and children. Observe yield, stop and speed limit signs; remind your children about the dangers of running and playing in the street and ask them to move out of the way of approaching vehicles.

Prince William County Police make frequent random visits within Lake Manassas and will take appropriate action to address speeding, running stop signs, use of unauthorized motorized vehicles, vandalism, and trespassing. Please obey stop signs and yield signs while driving in the community. There have been reports of near misses at the Spyglass Hill Loop circle due to driver's inattention to signs and approaching vehicles as well as damage to the common area due to speed and inattentive driving. To supplement regular police patrols, the Board is utilizing the County's Off Duty Police Patrol Program to patrol our streets, which is a "pay for" service. Please obey the laws of the road. Passing a stopped school bus constitutes reckless driving in Virginia and is punishable by up to 12 months in jail and/or a fine of up to \$2,500. We also ask that all residents report any suspicious activity to either the police or the management office depending on the time and nature of said activity. Let's all be on the lookout and keep Lake Manassas safe. Please contact gate attendants prior your guests arrival. To secure a temporary parking pass contact the on-site manager. If you or your guests park a vehicle in the street without notice having been given to the onsite manager, the vehicle will likely be issued a warning notice on the windshield. The vehicle information is then forwarded to the onsite office and a violation letter is issued to the owner or owner sponsoring the guest vehicle in question. Violations may result in fines of \$50 for each occurrence. For more

VEHICLE DECALS

We are making some headway in the distribution of 2016-17 vehicle decals but there are still a large number of residents who have not submitted registration forms for the new decal. Current decals are to appropriately identify residents who live in the community - it is a security issue. If you haven't obtained your new decal you are strongly encouraged to complete a registration form and drop it off with one of our gate attendants or bring it to the Onsite Office at the Swim and Tennis Center where you can pick up your new decals or leave it in our after-hours drop box. Gate attendants have been instructed to stop and record any vehicle that does not display a current vehicle decal. Please register your vehicle as soon as possible to avoid any delay in entering the community. If you need a registration form please contact the site office.

STREET PARKING:

We understand that over the holidays, or when you are receiving guests, parking in the street may be necessary. It seems, however, that the issue of vehicles parked in the street on a regular basis is becoming a problem.

When you moved to the community you were provided with documents containing the covenants, conditions and restrictions for the LMROA. The guidelines state that there is no street parking permitted without prior authorization of management. If you have room in your driveway then you should not have cars parked in the street. Understandably, for those who have multiple vehicles, rearranging cars to accommodate those who live in your home can be a nuisance, however, the parking rule was put in place to keep as many vehicles as possible off the roads for the safety and aesthetics of the community. If you or your guests require temporary street parking, please contact the site office for an approved parking pass. If you

COVENANTS INSPECTIONS:

The LMROA Community Handbook contains useful information covering Design Guidelines, Use Restrictions, Property Maintenance Standards and Enforcement Procedures. Please be sure to correct any violations that may exist on your property. If you need a copy of the most current Lake Manassas Handbook, please let us know and we will provide a copy to you at your request. Following are just a sample of a few important inspection items that need to be continuously maintained:

Mailboxes. Approved box color for the old style mailbox is hunter green and the post color is Duron Latex Oyster White. If you need to replace your mailbox, contact Main Street Mailboxes at 703.753.5521. Please feel free to call the on-site management office with any questions at 703.753.7745.

Yards and Lawns. Lawn maintenance items such as weed/crab grass control, dead trees and shrubs and edging as well as replenishing the mulch in your beds need to be continued throughout the year. Please do not leave grass clippings on the sidewalk and/or street.

Home Exteriors. Please look at your home and inspect for peeling and blistering paint and rotted wood, staining and green algae. Please power wash and repaint all affected surfaces. Play equipment. Outdoor play equipment must be approved by the Modifications and Construction Committee. Please obtain your approval before making any purchases. Remember, maintaining your property on a regular basis not only ensures that the standards of the community are preserved, but eliminates the need for violation notices, hearings and possible fines.

LEASING A COMMUNITY PROPERTY:

All leases must be minimally 12 months in duration. A copy of the lease must be submitted to the management office before the tenant moves in. Without a copy of the lease, your tenants will not be issued vehicle decals, transponders or pool passes. Please have your tenants stop by the onsite office to pick up a copy of the Lake Manassas Homeowners Handbook and Welcome Package. Remember, tenants are subject to the same residential requirements as all homeowners however, you as the owner, are still responsi-

ble for your property. LMROA will contact you as the homeowner for any reconciliation, as needed.

TRASH REMOVAL:

Our trash removal service is provided by American Disposal. Trash is collected weekly on Mondays and Thursdays, with recycling on Mondays and yard debris removal on Thursdays. A special pick up service is available for a fee (white goods, construction debris, etc.), but must be scheduled in advance. Please call American Disposal 703.368.0500 for details and scheduling.

Reminder: Please be sure not to set your trash out any sooner than the evening before collection (approximately 6 pm); trash cans and containers must be stored out of sight prior to sunrise the day after collection. This includes trash left by a landscaping company. When trash is put out a day or two before pick-up, the overall effect presents an unsightly appearance in our lovely neighborhood. On windy days, trash is easily blown down the street making the street and the community a mess. Be a good neighbor and tie it down and please be sure to cover all trash.

Fireworks. There have been reports of fireworks being set off in the area. This is not only against the law but can be dangerous to surrounding homes. Please do not set of fireworks in the community. PWC police or Fire Marshal will be called to investigate any incidents that occur.









Pets. There have been various reports of pets that are allowed to roam without a leash, urinate and defecate on private property and been aggressive toward people and other residents pets. If you experience difficulty with a neighbors pet, you should speak to the neighbor about your concerns. If you feel you need to contact the authorities you can call Prince William County Animal Control. After those options have been exhausted you may contact the onsite office and we will send a reminder of the Prince William County leash law and community guidelines for pets. Pets should not be allowed outside a confined area on your property without being controlled on a leash.

Please try to control your dog from barking excessively especially during the early morning and late evening hours. The on-site office regularly receives complaints regarding pets on private property. Always have your dogs leashed and do not let your cats roam the community.



Poets tell us that spring is the time of plants and projects; lawn experts tell us that spring is the time to get serious about our lawns. Springtime is a lawn's best friend, offering moderate temperatures, and consistent moisture. Unfortunately, spring conditions are also very friendly to our archenemy, weeds. Springtime is the best time to jump-start our lawns with nutrients while controlling those pesky weeds. We all know that grass and weeds are in a constant battle for precious space in our yards. We also know that strong healthy grass will always be victorious over the weed. However, undernourished, or moisture depleted grass, doesn't stand a chance. That is why it's vitally important to feed and irrigate our lawns. Once established in spring, crabgrass grows rapidly in hot weather and chokes out the good grass as it spreads. When it gets a foothold, there's not much -short of hand pulling the weeds -that can be done to stop it.

Keep in mind the goal of our spring lawncare is to encourage maximum root volume and depth to prepare the grass for summer heat and drought. Healthy soils, fertilizing, watering, and mowing practices help us achieve this.

Spring time in Lake Manassas is also the beginning of the yearly community wide comprehensive inspection. This inspection encompasses more than just lawns, the full perimeter of each property is walked and any violations are noted and brought to the homeowner's attention for correction. The Property Maintenance Standards are found in the LMROA Handbook -it can be found on-line or by contacting the on-site Management Office for a paper copy.


Some of the more common issues include:

- Home exteriors in disrepair- siding, gutters, downspouts, roof shingles, windows, doors that are blistering, peeling, rotting, missing, broken, or in other state of disrepair
- Mailboxes with a rotting and/or leaning post, missing paint, dented boxes, clasp that doesn't keep door closed
- Lawns with barespots, sun/heatburn, over 25% weeds, over six inches in height
- Bushes/trees that have not been thinned out or trimmed, dead plants, beds with less than a 2" layer of mulch
- Modifications that have been made to the property without approval of the Modifications and Construction Committee, including the removal of window mullions and outdoor play equipment.
- Unsightly accumulation of junk on patios, decks and driveways

The intent of the covenants process is to maintain the standards of the community so residents can enjoy its beauty and benefit from improved property values.

We are always looking for residents to volunteer for the Covenants Committee that have the time and are interested in seeing that the community is kept to the high standards that it deserves. Please contact me or Michelle Wingo if you are interested.

Since her second year at UVa, Jamie has been actively involved in a co-ed service

fraternity—Alpha Phi Omega (APO)—a group that is committed to service every day of the week throughout the Charlottesville community. Her work with APO, as well as fellow members who have done this ride before, inspired Jamie to take the challenge on herself.

"I love Charlottesville, but I've seen in recent years the wealth disparities and high levels of poverty in the area. I'm very grateful to APO for allowing me to break the bubble the university can create and be a helping hand to the over 900 nonprofits working to make Charlottesville better," says Jamie.

"Recently I've become more aware of the need for affordable housing in Charlottesville. Volunteering at Sunrise, the nation's first mobile home park to be redeveloped without resident displacement, and other Habitat for Humanity related events has showed me the side of Charlottesville that I may not have been aware of otherwise," Jamie adds.

Jamie will be training for her ride this spring as she prepares to graduate in May with a degree in English and Global Studies in Education. She will start her journey just a week after graduation and will begin applying to graduate Public Administration programs this fall with a focus on the nonprofit sector.

Lake Manassas resident, lamie Shalvey, will be cycling over 4000 miles from the shores of Providence. RI to the shores of Seattle, WA this summer to bring awareness to the growing need for affordable housing.

Jamie, a 2012 Battlefield High School graduate and fourth year student at University of

Virginia, will be joining about thirty other riders who have signed on with Bike & Build—a nonprofit organization that benefits affordable housing and empowers young adults for a lifetime of service and civic engagement. Bikers from all over the country, and world, participate in seven separate coast-to-coast routes for this cause.

The eleven week ride includes ten or more Build Days with organizations like Habitat for Humanity and Rebuilding Together in which the crew will spend a day at build sites doing drywall, painting, landscaping or any other project that will help to bring a family that much closer to an affordable home.

Along the route, the riders will stop to take in the sights and "camp out" each night at a designated host site which may be a school, church or community center. The Bike and Build group will offer presentations to the local community in an effort raise awareness for their cause.

The bike route starts with the challenging New England and Catskills terrain into the "flat" farmland states of Ohio. Indiana. Illinois, Iowa, and Nebraska. The Badlands, the Tetons and Yellowstone (South Dakota into Wyoming) follow, capped off by Montana. The final stretch takes a brief pass through Idaho into Washington and on to Seattle. The ride literally ends with plunge into the ocean!

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Flea Market Tips You spend half your life acquiring things & the other half trying to get rid of them




Spring has sprung and it's time to get outdoors. And Flea markets are a great place to get in some steps - and find some great items - especially if you are handy or artsy.

Here are some tips that will help to make your adventures more fun and successful:

Once you arrive remain calm. Buying at flea markets requires focus, and it can be difficult with crowds and all the potential confusion. Sometimes the best stuff is hiding. Look beyond the display table.

Be friendly. A lot of people who sell at flea markets do it for fun, and their things are often from personal collections. Take the time to chat and try to be respectful of their things, and considerate when

And bring cash. Many don't take credit and cash will give you more leverage. Small denominations help as well because finding exact change can take time.



Pricing can be complicated when it comes to antiques. If you are looking for something specific, try to do a little **research** on ebay or other antique sites to get an idea of the range that is fair. A knowledgeable bargainer is always respected. Decide what you want to pay before asking and then ask the seller if that is their "best price". Unlike retail shopping, in most case they will go lower than the marked price.



The early bird really does get the worm! Try to get to the flea market when it opens. You will be competing with savvy dealers from all over so you should plan to go when they do - when it opens. However if you are looking for a great deal - on nothing specific - wait until the very end when the seller might be looking to get rid of it rather than lug it back home. They may be a lot more apt to negotiate.

Know for what to look for:

Brass is Back: Look past the tarnish. More often than not, it's easily fixed with super fine wool and brass polish. Imagine great brass candlesticks with candles in various colors, like hot pink, watermelon or lime green. This is a great way to easily change up your decorations with the seasons.

Lighting: Flea markets are great places to buy great quality lighting (sconces, chandeliers). Just because it doesn't have a plug, or its missing crystals is no reason to pass it by. They are easily replaced. Rewiring a fixture is easier (and less expensive) than you think. An option is to head to Home Depot or Lowe's for a rewiring kit. Remember good lighting is an investment. High-end antique dealers on the web sell lighting for a lot of money, but you can find antique pieces with great character, then freshen them up yourself by rewiring them, adding new shades, trims, etc. One more thing: If you find wall sconces you love that plug in, let the cord hang, then paint it the same color as your wall.

Find new uses for old things, especially furniture: Dressers as sideboards, armoires as bathroom storage, a sofa as seating at a dining room table, outdoor furniture indoors (you make the rules!), little dressers with drop-sinks for powder rooms, antique rugs with holes to upholster ottomans. All wood isn't created equal, especially when it's veneer from reproductions. Paint it, repurpose it, and you'll love it all over again!

Look in cardboard boxes. Everyone sees the items on display - that have been cleaned up and presented well. But look for those boxes - which may have been pulled from a basement or attic - and haven't been opened in years. That is where the surprises really lie.

Look for frames. An elaborate frame can be dressed with ease. It can make even the most basic art look impressive. You can add a mirror to a frame and hang in the bathroom for a unique look. Consider a photo wall designed with a variety of sizes, shapes and styles. You can even paint in a variety of colors and switch them up with the season. Glue on sparkly features or border with shells you picked up on a recent vacation.

Finally a really special tip - consider spending a Saturday morning, on vacation, at garage sales. A friend told how his mom lives in a community where there is a high percentage of seniors. Often the children come to town and just want to sell - to get rid of things to simplify a parent's life or help them move or even to liquidate an estate.. They often don't have any idea of the value or their parents possessions and practically give things away.










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

Some Breathtaking Virginia Beauty



Are you interested in enjoying the Spring beauty of Virginia? Take your camera, hiking boots, or just pack a lunch and take a laid-back drive down any of the following popular byways. You will surely enjoy some breathtaking views.

Cool Mountain Drives:

Rattlesnake Point - Glide through the 105 miles of Skyline Drive through Shenandoah National Park, and along the crest of the Blue Ridge Mountains, starting at Front Royal and heading south to Waynesboro. At that point, the Blue Ridge Parkway which is often referred to as "America's Favorite Drive" - can carry you another 469 miles to North Carolina, if that is your desre. Don't miss Peaks of Otter, Mabry Mill and Blue Ridge Music Center.

Crabtree Falls -The Nelson Scenic Loop in Nelson County is 50 miles long incorporating the Blue Ridge Parkway with spurs leading to hiking, birding, amazing scenery like Crabtree Falls and tasty wineries and breweries.

The Highlands Scenic Byway - is a 19 mile loop between Clifton Forge and Lexington. The scenic drive is a must-see experience for all visiting Virginia's Western Highlands and makes the outdoors and nature accessible even to those who would rather not hike into a wilderness area.

The Appalachian Waters Scenic Byway - is an adjacent route to Highlands Scenic Byway that traverses Route 39 between Lexington and Summersville, West Virginia. Way points to look forward to are Goshen Pass, Millboro, Warm Springs, and Hot Springs, home of The Omni Homestead Resort.

Motorcyclists especially enjoy the winding cut-backs of Back of the Dragon, a "two lane ribbon" that courses between Tazewell and Marion in Southwest Virginia.

Big Walker Mountain Scenic Byway - passes through national forest and private land, showcasing mountain vistas, historic farm homesteads and tree-lined forests.

History and Beauty - Winding through America's Historic Triangle is Colonial Parkway, a 23-mile National Scenic Byway connecting Historic Jamestown, Jamestown Settlement, Colonial Williamsburg, Yorktown Battlefield and Yorktown Victory Center.

Lady Bird Johnson Park in Northern Virginia and traversing from George Washington's Mount Vernon Estate through Washington, DC and into Maryland, is the George Washington Memorial Parkway. More than 25 sites are available along the Parkway, inviting you to stop and stretch your legs.

The **Journey Through Hallowed Ground** is a scenic drive encompassing presidential and Civil War sites. It's 180 miles long and stretches from Gettysburg in Pennsylvania to Thomas Jefferson's Monticello. Download the National Heritage Area map.
