Over the past year, the board has been busy reviewing contracts for services which included trash removal, landscaping, insurance, pool management and gate security, as well as working with our Reserve Specialist on planning for our future needs. We are pleased that due to favorable contract negotiations and limited expenses for snow removal this past year, the community is in a strong financial position and thus there will be no increase to the base assessment for Fiscal Year 2018 (7/1/2017-6/30/2018). We would like to thank the Budget and Finance Committee for their participation and recommendations in reviewing contracts and budget development. GATE IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS


The Board is currently planning to implement improvements to all three gates in the community. We are in the final stages of identifying the sequence of the improvements that will enhance both access control and appearance of the gates with the goal of having the majority of the work completed by late summer. Details will be shared in the near future.

SWIM AND TENNIS AREAS

The pool management contract went out to bid this year and Virginia Pools was awarded a 3-year contract to manage the pool facilities. The board approved pool hours to include an early opening. COVENANTS

Annual covenants inspections were completed in mid-June. We would like to thank residents who moved to correct violations as soon as possible. The Modifications Committee is working with the Covenants Committee on an update to our Design Guidelines Handbook, which will be presented to the board for review prior to approval and implementation.

LIDL UPDATE

Thanks to everyone who attended the Town Hall meeting in February. Our efforts combined with the support of Prince William County Supervisor Lawson resulted in the decision by LIDL to remove the Turtle Point Drive egress from their plans. Construction is scheduled to start this summer.

Please keep in mind that lawns should be mowed regularly with grass being kept at 6 inches or less; garden beds should be mulched and along with lawns, kept as weed-free as possible.

And speaking of pool openings....the community pool is open daily from 11 a.m. until 8 p.m., however during the last week of August when Prince William County Schools are back in session, weekday hours will be from 3 p.m. until 8 p.m. The pool closes for the summer at 8 p.m. on Labor Day. If you need a pool pass please contact the site office to schedule a time to pick one up. If you have electronic key cards from previous years, then you do not need to register again -- electronic keys are intended to be used year after year.

If you happen to be moving this summer, I hope you have enjoyed your time at Lake Manassas and wish you the best as you journey on. When selling your home, you must order resale documents. To order these documents please go to: www.cmc-management.com or contact the office at 703-753-7745 so arrangements for a covenants resale inspection can be made. I will be happy to answer any questions you have about the Association in regard to the resale process. Note that pool passes and gate transponders (if available) should be transferred to your purchaser at settlement along with the keys to the house.

COVENANTS CORNER

Our annual inspections are complete for 2017. Each home has been inspected and where necessary reminders and/or violation letters have been issued for maintenance items. Our covenants administrator will be performing follow up inspections through the summer and fall. If you received a violation notice and wish to discuss the violation or need an extension of time to bring your property into compliance, please contact the site office at 703.753.7745.

TRASH REMOVAL

In January 2017, the LMROA entered into a new 5-year contract with American Disposal. Per this contract, as well as our previous 5-year contract, Trash and Recyclables will be picked up on Mondays and Trash and Lawn Debris will be picked up on Thursdays.

Trash, recycling and lawn debris should not be placed at the curb until the evening before pick up as noted above. If you have any questions about what American Disposal will pick up or when, or require a special pick up for large items, please contact them at 703-368-0500.

Placing trash, recyclables or lawn debris at the curb on non-removal days is unsightly and may result in the issuance of a covenants violation and possible penalties. While we realize many of our residents work in their yard over the weekend and it may be convenient to place grass clippings and other lawn debris at the curb for Monday pick up, the typical heavy volume of trash on Mondays does not allow for our contractor to remove lawn debris in conjunction with trash.

We appreciate the cooperation of all Lake Manassas residents in adhering to the covenants and rules thus keeping the community looking its best.





We want to acknowledge all those residents who did a bang-up job tidying up the exterior appearance of their homes this spring ... from seeding, feeding, weeding, trimming, clipping,

planting and mulching, to taking on cleaning and painting projects. We appreciate those residents who do their part to maintain and preserve the beauty of our community.

With summer comes grass cutting and shrub trimming and planting. Please remember that yard waste is collected on Thursdays, and is not to be put out on the curb until sundown the evening before collection. Unfortunately, we are seeing yard waste being set out as early as the weekend, giving the community a trashy appearance.

As a follow-up to the May email blast, please be aware of some of the more prevalent use restrictions and property maintenance standards (covenants) violations that are occurring:

· Vehicles of residents and their guests parked on the street instead of in garages or driveways - - exceptions for parties/special occasions must be addressed to the onsite association office.

- Trash and recycle containers that are not stored properly and are visible from the street or neighboring property.
- Trash and yard waste set out early.
- Mailboxes, trays and posts not maintained in proper order -rotting wood, leaning posts, broken trays, chipped paint, rusted and dented boxes, latches/hinges not in working order.
- Lawn not maintained properly grass exceeding 6 inches in height, not edged around curb/sidewalk/asphalt, clipping left in the street, contains more than 25% weeds, has bare spots.
- Garage doors not being kept closed at all times when not in use and not closed at night.
- Contractor signs on resident's property.
- Pets not on a leash when outside the confines of owner's property. Owners not cleaning up their animal's waste from common areas -- they should not be allowed to urinate or defecate on private property. Prince William County code and the LMROA require that we clean up after our pets.

The Lake Manassas Residential Owners Association and the Lake Manassas Association have awarded contracts to SOS Security LLC for Gate Attendant Services at the Stonewall Gate and the Baltusrol Gate. The Stonewall Gate is under the ownership and management of our homeowners' association and therefore we are responsible for the contract and payment for services. The gate on Baltusrol Drive is under the ownership and management of the Lake Manassas Association (LMA), our umbrella association, and therefore we share gate attendant contract costs with the RTJ Golf Club and to a lesser extent the other members of LMA. Both gates are operated under the same policies and Post Orders.

Our local SOS management team, the New Horizon Division of SOS, has its main office in Manassas. They also manage visitor access at Dominion Valley, Piedmont, and Heritage Hunt. SOS's attention to professionalism, their locally based experienced management team, attention to training and supervision, and experience with visitor access technology are among the reasons that they were awarded the contract.

All homeowners have been provided instructions for using GateKey, a web-based access management and processing system that provides you with the ability to manage your guests lists on line for efficient and timely processing of visitors and service providers. Gate Attendants can quickly access you guest lists using an iPad, verify your guest arrival and politely allow them to proceed. For our visitor access management system to operate effectively, all residents should use the GateKey management system.

If you have not logged into GateKey please refer to the Advisory Notice mailed to you on June 3 and access the GateKey webpage at www.GateKeyResident.com or through the Lake Manassas ROA website by clicking on Visitor Management. If you need log in support call SOS Security at (703) 988-5702 Monday through Friday from 9AM - 5PM, or email gatekey@sossecurity.com

Because our gates are not currently configured with a visitor ingress lane, a resident ingress lane and a turnaround lane (Stonewall), we cannot, as in other local gated communities, deny access to visitors or vendors not on your approved temporary or permanent visitor lists. Planning is underway to properly configure and improve our manned gates, but until then use of the full capability of GateKey will be in a transitional period.

Modifications & Construction (MCC)

COMMITTEE ROSTER Barbara Bassett Sara Howard Peter Metrinko If you are considering any alteration or improvement to the exterior of your home, you must first gain approval from the MCC. Prior to selling your home a resale inspection is performed. Unapproved exterior modifications may delay the sale of your home. Contact Michelle at the site office if you have any questions about approvals or the resale process.

The MCC typically meets on the second Monday of each month. If you plan to attend the meeting, please confirm with Michelle in advance to ensure the meeting date has not been changed. Note that fully complete modification applications must be filed at least four business days prior to that scheduled meeting in order to ensure the committee has time to examine them and schedule any needed property inspections. The application is available at the community website as well as at the onsite office. Michelle can assist you with any questions you may have with the process.

In addition to reviewing homeowner applications for exterior modifications, the committee, accompanied by our site manager and landscape superintendent, conducts monthly inspections of the common areas. The committee then provides a written report to the board of directors noting areas that are in need of replacements for dead and/or dying plants and vegetation. Note that natural or "save" areas are inspected however, while they may be mowed and trees pruned or removed if they are deemed hazardous, they are not professionally landscaped. Projects recently completed or currently in progress include clean up and installation of new plants inside the Turtle Point Gate and at the entrances to Valderrama Court as well as landscape revisions and plants replacements at the common area on Bonnie Briar Circle. Tree removal along with the installation of new sod and trees were planted on the common area lot on Tuxedo Lane and several hazardous or fallen trees were removed from common areas behind Cancun Court, Willingboro Court, Amsterdam Court and at the Swim and Tennis Center.

We hope you will enjoy the use of the pool, tot lot and tennis and basketball courts this summer. Pool hours are daily from 11 am until 8 pm, however during the last week of August when Prince William County Schools are back in session, weekday hours will be from 3 pm until 8pm. The pool closes for the summer at 8 pm on Labor Day.

Hours for tennis and basketball court use are weekdays from 7am until 10pm and weekends and holidays from 9am until 10pm. In order to comply with the Prince William County Noise Ordinance, the lights on the courts will go off promptly at 10pm. Therefore, anyone using the courts at night should exit by 10 pm. Remember, guests must be accompanied by residents when using the Swim and Tennis Center facilities. Our off duty patrols who monitor activity in the community will request anyone unaccompanied by a resident to exit the facility. The basketball hoop and tennis court nets were recently replaced. There will be some minor cracks repaired on the courts this summer. While repairs are being made there will be no access to the courts which will be cordoned off for a day or two until they are ready to be reopened. In order to keep our courts from deteriorating and in the best shape possible, rollerblading, skate boarding and the use of hard balls on the courts – and the tennis back boards, is prohibited.

If you are a regular visitor to the pool, you will notice that our furniture has been refurbished and umbrellas have been replaced. We have confidence in our new pool management company, Virginia Pools, to keep the pool and surrounding deck and locker rooms clean and looking their best. A new automatic chlorination system has been installed which will help keep chemical levels in the water consistent and at the appropriate levels at all times. We have also ordered a defibrillator for the Swim and Tennis Center should an unfortunate medical emergency arise. The pool is scheduled for white coating this year, which will not be done until the fall of 2017.

Summer Gardening

Summer, time to really enjoy your yard. But there are some vital steps to take to insure your property will be healthy and beautiful. Following are a few tips:

- Stay on top of weeds and insects so they don't become a major problem. You can treat the weeds with a non-selective herbicide like Roundup or do it the old-fashioned way and pull them. A combination of the two is generally most effective, pulling weeds that are close to landscape plants and spraying the weeds in open areas.
- Set mower blades high. Letting turf grow a little taller is better for it, and also helps hide any weeds that may grow.
- If your lawn is wet, and the weather is humid, you may see fungal diseases like rust and red thread. Most of these will go away naturally when conditions get dryer, but you can also treat them with chemical fungicides.
- If you notice insects attacking plants in June, such as bagworms, Japanese beetles and lace bugs or aphids and scale insects, you need to treat. Treatments are highly specific to the type of insect and time of the attack.
- Monitor rainfall with a rain gauge; plants in the Northern Virginia region generally need about an inch of water a week. Dig down a few inches into the dirt around your plants. If you come up with dust, they're probably not getting enough water.

- If you have an irrigation system, monitor it throughout the summer. Most irrigation parts are made out of plastic, and they do break. Just because everything worked when the sprinkler company started the system in April, doesn't mean it's running at 100 percent now.
- Whether you're watering with an automatic sprinkler system or a hose, less frequent watering for longer durations is better than watering for a short time every day. Don't rely on the sprinkler you're using for your lawn to water your trees and shrubs. Their needs are different, and you're better off watering them with a drip line or by hand. Water landscape plants slowly and soak the root system once or twice a week, depending on rainfall.
- You also want to keep up with pruning during the summer. Here's a review of proper pruning practices:
 - Thin-rather than shear-the shrub;
 - In selecting what to prune out, look for crossing branches, those that are dead or damaged and branches that create access or sight distance issues.
 - Pruning tall shrubs and especially trees; can be dangerous! If you need to use a ladder to do it, you should probably call a professional.

Some Favorite Perennial Flowers to Consider

Following are some easy care, long-living plants which spark beautiful foliage and flowers, year after year. They are best to plant in the fall or spring when the ground is cool - but you will want to plan for them now while the rest of your garden is in full bloom. In this way there will be no guess work concerning where they will work best and what color to select.



Alstroemeria (Peruvian lily)

Flowers of the evergreen hybrids come in shades of purple with dark flecks and last well in bouquets. Alstroemeria aurea blooms come in shades of yellow and orange. The 2-to 3-foot tall plants produce flowering shoots as long as the soil doesn't get too hot. (Twist the shoot off at the base to keep them coming).



Delicate-looking flowers on ultra-tough plants tolerate just about any soil type. They grow to 2 feet-tall and pumps out 2 1/2-inch lavender-blue flowers almost all year if spent ones are removed.



Catmint (Nepeta x faassenii)

Loose spikes of lavender-blue flowers cover the soft, silvery-green mounds in late spring and early summer. As soon as blossoms fade, shear plants back by half, or cut faded flower stems to the ground to encourage rebloom. Plants can grow to I foot tall make attractive, informal hedges.



Forget-me-not (Myosotis sylvatica)

These much-loved plants bear tiny but exquisite blue flowers in spring in mild climates. These true blue flowers grow 6 to 8 inches tall.

Coreopsis - Mango Punch

This low, mounding perennial covers itself in summer with mango-orange flowers that have a red blush. Most loved is the fresh, fruity hue of this new variety. Clip the faded blooms so the flowers will keep coming.



Gaillardia x grandiflora

Cheerful daisylike blooms in various warm shades of yellow, bronze, and red. Many varieties are available, with single or double flowers. They can grow 2 1/2 - 3 feet tall.



Geum chiloense

Tall flower spikes grow from mounds of velvety foliage to 15 inches high, 2 feet wide.



${\it W}_{\it ant More Butterflies?}$ Be a Good Host and Welcome the Caterpillar

Do a quick search of the internet and you'll find 101 ways to eliminate pesky caterpillars. A no-brainer, right? Caterpillars munch the leaves of our favorite plants, and some, like the tomato hornworm, can spell disaster in the vegetable garden. But consider this: most caterpillars are juvenile forms of the bugs that we love, the ones we want in our gardens, like the threatened Monarch butterfly. If we want more butterflies, then we must provide not just nectar for the adults, but host plants for their eggs, a food source for those hungry caterpillars, and a safe place to cocoon and begin the transformation to adulthood.

Before grabbing the nearest pesticide, spend some time figuring out what sorts of caterpillars you've got in your garden. Peterson's First Guide to Caterpillars of North America is just one resource, but there are many others online and in bookstores. Instead of garden pests, you may find you're hosting the next generation of Spicebush Swallowtail or Wild Indigo Dustywing.

Rather than eliminating caterpillars, why not invite them into the garden by adding more butterfly host plants. Many butterflies are host-specific - meaning they will only lay eggs on a certain plant. Monarchs, for example, will only lay eggs on milkweed (Asclepias). But many other types of butterflies, moths and skippers are also specialists. By planting a wide variety of trees, shrubs and flowers, we're ensuring the greatest number of butterfly species have a chance to make it to adulthood. To figure out what kinds of plants to grow, check out the Xerces Society online or look for their book Attracting Native Pollinators, which provides a list of butterflies that are native to our region, and their larval host plants.

If you don't have a big yard or space for more plants, why not add a few pots of flowers that attract pollinators, or grow a pot of dill or parsley, a favorite of the Eastern Black Swallowtail? You can even tuck a few sunflowers, the host plant of the Painted Lady butterfly, into an existing bed.


ove of Italy Makes Lake Manassas Man A Unique Tour Guide

"You're not a tourist when you visit Italy with me," said Tom Trivisani, in a recent interview from his Lake Manassas home office where he fields requests for his singular tours. "With me as a guide, people go where the Italians go and not to the tourist traps."

Tom's "retirement career," guiding tours through Italy, developed gradually, he said. For many years he was merely a frequent visitor to that country, but in his retirement he came to enjoy sharing his Italian experiences so much, he took to arranging and conducting personalized tours for other travelers. At first his tours were only for

friends and family, but eventually he branched out to other interested people.



Tom's tours are based from his Italian house in Itri, a small town near the Mediterranean. The town is so small the welcome sign and the leaving sign are in the same place, Tom joked. Located between Rome and Naples, 110 kilometers from each, Itri is off the beaten path for Americans, but is a popular spot for vacationing Italians, Germans and Swiss. Tom's Italian-born wife, Francesca, lived near Itri before coming to the U.S. as a child, and she still has family connections there.

The Trivisanis settled in Lake Manassas in 1998, when Tom retired from his career as an Administrator of Embassies for the State Department. He and his family lived in nine different countries over the years, and Tom will regale the visitor to his Lake Manassas house with stories about pieces of art and furniture he has collected from all over the world, but once he retired, it was Italy that kept drawing him back.

"I love everything about Italy," Tom said, so by 2002 he was ready to build on family property in Itri. In the process, he collected more stories that he is always willing to serve up for his listeners' entertainment.

"Do you see any road up there?" he asked, his eyes dancing as he pointed out a picture of his hill property before he built on it. "No. I had to build one myself," he laughed. He also said he had to buy all of the equipment, including poles, to bring electric power to his hilltop. Once built, the house needed only the addition of a station wagon and Tom was set to spend every May through August in his Italian home. It's when he is in residence that he takes in his guests.

"It's not about money," he said of his tours. What Tom enjoys is getting to see all of Italy and having company while doing it. His wife continues to work for the State Department and is able to spend only one month a year in Italy with him. So when his wife can't join him, Tom enjoys the company of people who pay their own expenses and, he said, if they occasionally pay for his gas and food, too, that's fine.



Tom's hilltop house overlooks a pristine view with the Mediterranean visible from his patio. A 2000-year-old stone wall that was a part of the Romans' Appian Way runs through the property. A nearby beach offers water so clear you can see right through it. Beautifully displayed, fresh produce and seafood is available daily and it's possible to scoop up enough mussels from under a rock to make one of Tom's favorite pasta dishes.

"I am a very good cook," Tom said with a smile, rounding out his idyllic description of Itri

Tom turned down 22 requests for tours this year because of health concerns. However, he said he has recovered and he was ready to return to Italy in May, as usual, with some family and friends. He's looking forward to his wife's retirement when she can join him in spending five months a year in Itri and he wants to go back to enjoying Italy with as many people as he can.






ake Manassas Resident Publishes Children's Book!





COVENANTS INSPECTIONS:

While we understand that there are certain aspects of property maintenance, that cannot be attended to during certain times of the year, and in certain weather conditions, please do your best to keep your property maintained according to LMROA guidelines. If you are issued a violation notice and need an extension of time to complete repairs, please contact the on-site office by calling 703.753.7745.

The LMROA Community Handbook contains useful information covering Design Guidelines, Use Restrictions, Property Maintenance Standards and Enforcement Procedures. Please be sure to correct any violations that may exist on your property. If you need a copy of the most current Lake Manassas Handbook, please let us know and we will provide a copy to you at your request. Following is just a sample of a few important inspection items that need to be continuously maintained:

Mailboxes. Approved box color for the old style mailbox is hunter green and the post color is Duron Latex Oyster White. If you need to replace your mailbox, contact Main Street Mailboxes at 703.753.5521. Please feel free to call the on-site management office with any questions at 703.753.7745.

Yards and Lawns. Lawn maintenance items such as weed/crab grass control, dead trees and shrubs and edging as well as replenishing the mulch in your beds need to be continued throughout the year. Please do not leave grass clippings on the sidewalk and/or street.

Home Exteriors. Look at your home and inspect for peeling and blistering paint and rotted wood, staining and green algae. Please power wash and repaint all affected surfaces.

Play equipment. Outdoor play equipment must be approved by the Modifications and Construction Committee. Please obtain your approval before making any purchases. Remember, maintaining your property on a regular basis not only ensures that the standards of the community are preserved, but eliminates the need for violation notices, hearings and possible fines.

COMMUNITY SAFETY:

Vehicle Decals - Reminder letters on registering vehicles were sent to residents who had not registered or picked up their 2016-17 decals. While we have seen an increase in the number of residents who have complied, there are still many who have not. If you need vehicle decals please contact the on-site management office.

Please drive slowly and use caution as you drive through the community keeping an eye out for pedestrians and children. Observe yield, stop and speed limit signs; remind your children about the dangers of running and playing in the street and ask them to move out of the way of approaching vehicles.

Prince William County Police are making more frequent random visits within Lake Manassas and will take appropriate action to address speeding, running stop signs, use of unauthorized motorized vehicles and vandalism. Please obey stop signs and yield signs while driving in the community. There have been reports of near misses at the Spyglass Hill Loop circle due to driver's inattention to signs and approaching vehicles as well as damage to the common area due to speed and inattentive driving. To supplement regular police patrols, the Board is

utilizing the County's Off Duty Police Patrol Program to patrol our streets, which is a "pay for" service. Please obey the laws of the road. Passing a stopped school bus constitutes reckless driving in Virginia and is punishable by up to 12 months in jail and/or a fine of up to \$2,500. We also ask that all residents report any suspicious activity to either the police or the management office depending on the time and nature of said activity. Let's all be on the lookout and keep Lake Manassas safe. Please contact gate attendants prior your guests arrival. To secure a temporary parking pass, contact the on-site manager.

STREET PARKING:

We understand that over the holidays, or when you are receiving guests, parking in the street may be necessary. It seems, however, that the issue of vehicles parked in the street on a regular basis is becoming a problem.

When you moved into the community, you were provided with documents containing the covenants, conditions and restrictions for the LMROA. The guidelines state that there is no street parking permitted without prior authorization of management. If you have room in your driveway then you should not have cars parked in the street. Understandably, for those who have multiple vehicles, rearranging cars to accommodate those who live in your home can be a nuisance, however, the parking rule was put in place to keep as many vehicles as possible off the roads for the safety and aesthetics of the community. If you or your guests require temporary street parking, please contact the on-site office for an approved parking pass. If you or your guests park a vehicle in the street without notice having been given to the on-site manager, the vehicle will likely be issued a warning notice on the windshield. The vehicle information is then forwarded to the on-site office and a violation letter is issued to the owner or owner sponsoring the guest vehicle in question. Violations may result in fines of \$50 for each occurrence. If you continually disregard the

parking regulations, you may be called to a hearing before the Covenants Committee and fined for each infraction.

TRASH:

Our trash removal service is provided by American Disposal. Trash is collected weekly on Mondays and Thursdays, with recycling on Mondays and yard debris removal on Thursdays. A special pick up service is available for a fee (white goods, construction debris, etc.), but must be scheduled in advance. Please call



American Disposal 703.368.0500 for details and scheduling. Reminder - please be sure not to set your trash out any sooner than the evening before collection (approximately 6 pm); trash cans and containers must be stored out of sight prior to sunrise the day after collection. This includes trash left by a landscaping company. When trash is put out a day or two before pick-up, the overall effect presents an unsightly appearance in our lovely neighborhood. On windy days, trash is easily blown down the street making the street and the community unsightly. Be a good neighbor and tie it down and please be sure to cover all trash.

 Inclement Weather: Roadway safety is our primary concern. Roads and/or areas, which are deemed unsafe due to snow or ice, will be suspended for collection. If we are unable to provide collection, services will resume as soon as it is safe to do so.



PETS:

Pets must not be allowed to roam without a leash, urinate and defecate on private property. If you experience difficulty with a neighbors pet, you should speak to the neighbor about your concerns. If you feel you need to contact the authorities, you can call Prince William County Animal Control. After those options have been exhausted you may contact the on-site office and we will send a reminder of the Prince William County leash law and community guidelines for pets. Pets should not be allowed outside a confined area on your property without being controlled on a leash.

Please try to control your dog from barking excessively especially during the early morning and late evening hours. The on-site office regularly receives complaints regarding pets on private property. Always have your dogs leashed and do not let your cats roam the community.

Cats should be kept indoors and not allowed to wander onto neighboring properties. If you are concerned about cats on your property and do not know who they belong to, they may be feral (born to stray cats). In any case, if you experience problems with pets wandering onto your property, contact Prince William County Animal Control for advice or to report issues with neighborhood pets and/or feral cats.

LEASING A COMMUNITY PROPERTY:

All leases must be a minimum of 12 months in duration. A copy of the lease must be submitted to the management office before the tenant moves in. Without a copy of the lease, your tenants will not be issued vehicle decals, transponders or pool passes. Please have your tenants stop by the on-site office to pick up a copy of the Lake Manassas Homeowners Handbook and Welcome Package. Remember, tenants are subject to the same residential requirements as all homeowners however, you as the owner, are still responsible for your property. LMROA will contact you as the homeowner for any reconciliation, as needed.

COURTEOUS NEIGHBORS:

Please do not walk on private property which includes residents' lawns and the golf course. Please keep children and animals off the golf course. Golfers retrieving golf balls are allowed to walk in the resident's yards that back up on the golf course.

Although on-street parking is not permitted in Lake Manassas, we do understand there are occasions when temporary parking on

the street may be necessary, for example, children's birthday parties and holiday dinners. Please make every effort to have your guests park in your empty driveway spaces first.



Noise Ordinance Times: The Prince William County noise ordinance is Monday through Friday from 10 pm until 6 am and on Saturday, Sunday and Holidays from 10 pm until 9 am. If you were to contact the police regarding what you consider to be an inappropriate time for unusually loud noises, they will come out and investigate. But first, speak to your neighbors to explain that the noise is disturbing to you.

Complaints: The on-site office regularly receives complaints on a variety of topics that most recently include:

- Cigarette butts and gum are both unsightly and hazardous to pets when disposed of improperly on the street and/or on private property;
- Dogs barking and biting; Pets off leash and/or roaming and defecating on private property;
- Neighbor's lawns not mowed or weeded properly;
- · Speeding;
- · Vehicles running stop signs;
- RV's and/or boats brought into the community and left overnight and/ or parked in dangerously in the street.

Management will address these issues as they arise, however some issues are best resolved neighbor to neighbor. We thank you in advance for following the County laws as well as the community rules and being a considerate neighbor.



FIREWORKS:

Fireworks are prohibited in Lake Manassas and [most] are in violation of Prince William County laws. Any incidents of unlawful fireworks will be reported to the Fire Marshal to investigate and take necessary action.

Zoning Administration



Do you know that Lake Manassas ... is a 770-acre reservoir. It is owned and operated by the city of Manassas, although it is located outside the city limits. The reservoir was created in the late 1960s to provide drinking water for area residents. Today it contributes to a regional water system which serves the cities of Manassas and Manassas Park, and unincorporated areas of Prince William County. Other than Stonewall you will also find Robert Trent Jones and Virginia Oaks Golf Clubs on the banks.

In the 1980s, and continuing until 1995, public access to the lake was possible via a private marina. In 1999, the marina operator and the City of Manassas did not reach a mutually acceptable contract extension and the marina was closed. Since then, there has been no public boating access to Lake Manassas. In 2004, citing concerns over terrorism and the possibility of contamination by Zebra Mussels, the Manassas City Council passed an ordinance making it illegal to operate a boat on Lake Manassas. Periodic attempts have been made by the city, county, and various others to reopen the lake for public use; so far, none have been successful.




