As summer comes to an end, we would like to thank those residents who returned their proxies for the Annual Meeting at the Stonewall Golf Club held on

September 28th. We appreciate that five residents submitted declarations of candidacy for the three open positions on the Board of Directors for the next two years. A blast email announcing the outcome of the election was sent.

We are pleased to report that the final financial report for Fiscal Year 2017 ending on June 30, 2017 shows the Community in a very strong financial position (report is posted on our website). The surplus was due to lower than expected snow removal costs and favorable contract negotiations. Thanks to all committees who helped us achieve these results! The surplus funds will be used in 2017-18 to fund homeowner's equity and, along with Basheer designated funds, our Community gate improvements, which were identified at the July 6, 2017 Special Meeting.

COMMUNITY GATE IMPROVEMENTS

Baltusrol – Plans are progressing to make a resident only access lane.

Amsterdam – Replace the boulder on the pedestrian path with a lighted bollard.

Stonewall - There is good progress being made regarding the addition of a Resident Lane at the Stonewall Entrance. The bond and permits required by Prince William County have been submitted. Our vendor, Gate Logic, has been coordinating with the County and expects their approval shortly and without delay. During the week of September II the work area and light pole to be relocated was to be staked to outline those areas. Dominion Energy was scheduled to relocate the light pole that same week. Gate Logic has indicated that site work should begin no later than the week of September 25. Once the resident lane construction has been completed the landscape upgrade will occur shortly thereafter. Our plan is also to cover the outside of the Gate House with cultured stone once the other construction work has been completed. Residents living on the Western Peninsula should expect some delays entering the Stonewall Gate as construction progresses. Community residents should also routinely check for Community Blast Emails for that information and updates on changes to entrance/exit traffic patterns during construction.

CSVAC - Our new gate security contractor SOS is on board and performing well — Please register for Gate Key! As we complete the resident only access lanes at Baltusrol and Stonewall, we will begin the transition to turning unregistered guests away to enhance our neighborhood security. Bids have been received for the traffic-calming plan which will replace speed bumps with speed humps

Communications - We welcome Shashi Mehta as our Committee Chairman and thank Dick LaFrance for his service. Ram Venkateswaran has also joined the Committee. PLEASE register at Imroa.com if you have not already done so.



CWS Tower - Community residents have been asked to please give the Board your feedback regarding construction of the tower near the VDOT facility. We will use your feedback from the balloon tests announced in the recent flyer to make our recommendation to the county for permitting.

The current transponders that open the Stonewall and Amsterdam gates have doubled in price and it is likely that over the next several years the transponders and antenna system will be phased out by 3M, the manufacturer. While your existing transponders will continue to work until they wear out and need to be replaced, the committee is recommending to the Board that new, less expensive, passive tags be utilized for replacements and for newly registered vehicles. The passive tags are rear view mirror hanging tags and transferable to other community registered vehicles. Our current transponder readers will need to be replaced sometime in the future due to obsolescence and manufacture nonsupport. At that time a new, passive RFID system would be installed. The hanging passive tags would be compatible with any new passive reader system that is used to replace our current transponder readers.

The committee received three bids for removal of existing speed bumps and installation of speed humps and cross walk speed tables on various LMROA roads per the Committee's traffic calming (study copy available upon request). The bids will be reviewed by the committee and a recommendation made to the Board to proceed with a selected contractor to remove the old speed bumps and install the new speed humps and cross walk speed tables. The speed humps and speed tables are less impactful to vehicles but serve the same purpose of helping to maintain posted traffic speeds. The Committee also agreed that the Board should proceed with the purchase of a pole-mounted vehicle speed monitor. The monitor would be used at various locations in the community. Data gathered from monitor records over time will suggest where it can be most effectively used and where more active enforcement methods are needed. Also, the data can be used to determine if a second monitor is justified at some point in the future.

Due to an increase in the volume of street parking and trash covenants violations, the LMROA is implementing an "off hours" inspection program (the hours the on-site

Management office is closed) to specifically identify and take appropriate action to address these concerns.

In accordance with Lake Manassas covenants, on street parking is prohibited throughout the entire Community. This safety and aesthetics policy applies to owners, residents and their guests. Streets that are open and clear make it much easier for motorists to see children playing or riding their bikes and provide a clear line of sight for walkers, runners, and others. It affords children and adults the opportunity to see oncoming traffic even if they can't hear it. In addition, many residents bought in this community because of its appearance. Part of that appeal is the uncluttered look of the streets.

The covenants also states that trash and recyclables are collected on Mondays while trash and yard waste (mostly leaves at this time of year) are

collected on Thursdays. The containers can be put out on the curb no earlier than sundown on Sundays and Wednesdays. Nothing detracts from the appearance of our community more than seeing trash, recycling, and bags/containers of grass/shrub clippings in view in advance of scheduled collection dates and times.

Every homeowner is responsible for maintaining the beauty of Lake Manassas. If residents witness a covenants violation, it benefits the entire community to report that violation to the Covenants Administrator so she can address it and work with the homeowner to cure it. It takes all of us working together to keep Lake Manassas a premier community.

Please remember, the intent of the covenants process is to maintain the high standards of the community so residents can enjoy its beauty and benefit from improved property values.

GATE KEY

If you have not yet registered on Gate Key, our new visitor access system, please do so!

- Registering on Gate Key allows ease of entry for your visitors and guests;
- You can opt to receive a text or email message upon arrival of your guests;
- Our current no "turn away" policy may change in the near future at which time anyone not entered on to your permanent or temporary visitor list may not be admitted, causing them and you inconvenience.

COVENANTS PATROLS



We recently contracted with SOS Security to provide us with an "after hours" patrol service to record and report street parking and trash violations during times when management staff is not on site (evenings and weekends).

Note that violation notices will be sent to homeowners who continually park their vehicles in the street (including RVs, boats and trailers) or put/leave their trash cans and grass clippings out prior to the evening before pick up. Trash and recyclables are picked up on Mondays and Trash and Lawn Debris are picked up on Thursdays (not to be placed at curb prior to dusk the evening before a pick up). **Keep in mind that violation charges may be assessed to your account for continued non-compliance.**

SOS can be spotted in one of their marked patrol cars as seen here. They will photograph violations and email them to the site office where staff will begin due process for violations.

It is important to note that if you are in the process of selling your home.

are in the process of selling your home, Resale Documents must be ordered. You can order these documents by going to www.cmc-management.com and clicking on the "Order Resale Documents" tab at the top of the page. After resale documents are ordered, an

inspection of your property by CMC will be done; the information from this inspection is provided to the buyer to ensure that all exterior modifications have been approved and your home conforms to the LMROA Design Guidelines. It is very important that you submit an application for those changes which you have completed without the approval of the Modifications Committee. Otherwise this will be noted as a violation on the resale report and could impact or delay the sale of the home. If you have any questions regarding this process you can contact the site office at 703-753-7745 or Community Management Corporation's Resale Department at 703-631-7200.

If you are considering any alteration or improvement to the exterior of your home, you must first gain approval from the MCC. Modification applications must be filed at least four business days prior

to a scheduled meeting in order to ensure the committee has time to examine them and schedule any needed property inspections. The application is available at the community website as well as at the onsite office. Michelle can assist you with any questions you may have with the process.

In addition to reviewing modifications applications the MCC, along with our site manager and landscape supervisor, performs monthly common area inspections. If you have questions or concerns about common areas, please contact Michelle at the site office and we will add it to our agenda.

The Committee is reviewing the Lake Manassas Handbook and Design Guidelines and will make some recommended updates to the Board of Directors. When the new Handbook is complete, we will notify residents and copies will be available for pick up at the site office.

The MCC meets on the second Monday of the month at 5:00 PM at the Swim and Tennis Center office – all residents are welcome to attend and applicants are encouraged to attend. Occasionally the meeting date is rescheduled due to members' availability, so please check our online calendar (www.lmroa.com) or with Michelle to confirm meeting dates and times.

The 2017 pool season has come to an end. We are very pleased with the performance of Virginia Pools and the life guards staffed here this summer. Overall, the pool season went well with many compliments and very few complaints.

POOL IMPROVEMENTS

Lake Manassas has a Reserve Fund with dollars earmarked for repair and replacement of all components in the community – including items at the Swim and Tennis facility. Prior to pool opening, all of our pool chairs were refurbished and re-strapped and several new umbrellas were ordered. Another item budgeted for this year was to white coat the pool after it is drained this fall. A new pool cover has also been ordered for the main pool.

The Swim and Tennis Committee will be making recommendations to the board with suggested enhancements, especially for the wading pool, next year.

Following are a few things you can say to a solicitor who decides to show up on your property uninvited. This applies to all residents whether you live inside or

outside of the gated community.

Top three responses are:

- I. "Lake Manassas is private property and you are trespassing."
- 2. "There is a very visible no soliciting sign posted at all of the entrances of the community."
- 3. If you do not immediately cease soliciting and leave, I will phone the Sheriff's Office and report you for trespassing."

Afterwards, please send the ROA staff a brief email identifying the date, approximate time and solicitor contact information. Homeowners can also turn in any flyers or business cards left at their residence to the ROA office and we will contact the solicitor to notify them that soliciting is prohibited in Lake Manassas. The ROA staff cannot provide real time interception of solicitors by going to the location at the very moment they are at your home.

THE GREAT AMERICAN SOLAR ECLIPSE OF 2017

A remarkable event in our history, captured by our own resident photographer!



The Mehta Family

I have been fascinated by Astronomy since my Junior School years, and I am passionate about photography. This was THE event for me to see in-person, photograph, and share with my family – along with an estimated I 50 million others in the USA.

The Eclipse was best seen starting from Oregon on the West coast to South Carolina on the East. The path of totality was 70 miles wide, and the closer

you were to the center, the greater the effect of totality and duration. We picked Charleston, South Carolina for our experience booking hotels almost 4 months in-advance. Many hotels were booked up to 2 years in advance. Charleston SC had a visitor population of 2-3 million during eclipse weekend, per police estimates.

Totality (100% blockage of the Sun by the Moon) was from 2:41pm-2:44pm, with the eclipse ending at 4:06pm. We had scoped out Isle of Palms beach to witness the eclipse, however, on the day of the eclipse, the forecast was iffy – there were lots of clouds and the possibility of thunderstorms. So at 10am, we made the decision to travel to Lexington, SC (outskirts of Columbia, SC). It is located on the center of totality, and the 2 hour drive ensured we had a HIGH probability of seeing a clear sky with just the Sun and the Moon doing their dance. The roads were packed, rest areas closed due to overload of watchers, and there were LOTS of police every couple of miles ensuring no one parked on the sides of the highways to observe.

At 12:45pm, we were positioned. Our Solar glasses ready, my Nikon Semi-Pro DSLR ready mounted on a Tripod using a 300mm lens magnified to 450mm, Solar filter installed on the Lens front, all critical to prevent permanent damage to eyes and camera sensors.

At precisely 1:12pm, we saw a sliver of the Moon enter the Sun's view. Until 2:30pm, the sky and air around us got progressively greyer as if someone had placed an artificial filter or painted everything medium grey. At 2:39pm, 2 minutes before 100% totality (Sun being totally covered blocked by the Moon), the crickets in the trees began to



make their LOUD noises. The birds began to fly around as if looking for their place to spend the night, just before typical Dusk. By this time, the temperature of the air and radiant heat had fallen by almost 25 degrees, from 98 degrees to now 73 degrees. A cooler wind began blowing as if nightfall had arrived.

At 2:41 pm, there was NO MORE SUN. Only during this time, can you take off your protective Solar eclipse glasses and see with the naked eye, see phases referred to as Baily's Beads and the Diamond Ring effect. My family and I looked at the sky in awe, saw a halo of light behind the moon – as if someone had a fluorescent light turned on behind the moon. The effect and photo magnificent. Then we saw the "Diamond Ring" effect and quickly took photo. This view is indescribable. It is as if there is a diamond stud on the side of a ring, BUT in fact it is the Sun's light being reflected through the canyons of the Moon, causing this magnificent effect – lasting less then 10 seconds. At 2:44pm, the Moon begins to exit the Sun's view and the process reverses – revealing an increasing slice of the moon with each second. For this phase also, Solar glasses are mandatory to prevent instant blindness to the human eye.

There is LOUD applause by all of the spectators witnessing this epic event. There is crying and tears by some of the spectators. There is total awe at the spectacle my family and I just witnessed. And I am overjoyed I was able to see the event with my own eyes and capture with photographs to share with friendsand family.

YOU CAN MAKE THE DIFFERENCE!

Every time I drive through the area, I see a new business. Every time! But the sad part is that there are closings as well. Many are small businesses - a single person's dream. But larger ones as well.

Research shows us that some 8 out of 10 new businesses fail. For some, it's due to poor management, but for many it's because residents didn't even know they were there. Staples store inventory is low because people are ordering on line. If this continues we won't have places to shop or the options will be extremely limited.

Recently we visited Seattle, the home of Amazon. The city is in a mass build mode to accommodate all the new hires. They are growing in leaps and bounds. They are also working on a model where when you shop in their store - a device will note what's in your cart and automatically bill you for the items. Some would think this great innovation but others feel as though we are becoming a robotic nation.

I realize that we discussed this issue a bit in a previous issue, but this subject needs to be explored thoroughly, for a number of reasons. Just look at the math for buying close to home, as it is compelling. For every \$100 spent at a locally-owned business, \$73 remains in the local economy, and \$27 leaves. Compare that to the same \$100 spent at a non-locally owned business. How much stays here when you shop via Recent research from Civic Economics (www. civiceconomics.com) indicates that local eateries return nearly 79 percent of revenues to the community, compared to just over 30 percent for chain restaurants. When profits stay local, it increases the community's wealth, tax revenue and standard of living.

Small and local businesses are still the backbone of our economy. They are local people serving local people and are generally commit-



ted to staying there, raising their families. After all, most businesses started out as a small, local business and earned the success of growing and expanding. It's the American Dream. If we keep spending online sending our monies to monopolies and out of state, much less the country - what will happen to the American Dream?

As if this wasn't enough to convince you, consider what local purchasing affords us:

- lobs
- A personal connection
- Dealing with an owner who has knowledge and perhaps a passion for the products or services
- Local business contributes to the tax base, gives us something to do - shop and attend events supported by their business.
- They support future growth of the community.
- They offer innovation.
- The opportunity for immediate fulfillment for your shopping needs
- Community and support of the products you are purchasing.

And these local businesses support the community - it is because of them that your swim team, schools and non-profits to name just a few ... support this community publication and it comes to you at no charge.







LAKE MANASSAS COMMUNITY INFORMATION

COVENANTS INSPECTIONS:

While we understand that there are certain aspects of property maintenance that cannot be attended to during certain times of the year, and in certain weather conditions, please do your best to keep your property maintained according to LMROA guidelines. If you are issued a violation notice and need an extension of time to complete repairs, please contact the on-site office by calling 703.753.7745.

The LMROA Community Handbook contains useful information covering Design Guidelines, Use Restrictions, Property Maintenance Standards and Enforcement Procedures. Please be sure to correct any violations that may exist on your property. If you need a copy of the most current Lake Manassas Handbook, please let us know and we will provide a copy to you at your request. Following is just a sample of a few important inspection items that need to be continuously maintained:

Mailboxes. Approved box color for the old style mailbox is hunter green and the post color is Duron Latex Oyster White. If you need to replace your mailbox, contact Main Street Mailboxes at 703.753.5521. Please feel free to call the on-site management office with any questions at 703.753.7745.

Yards and Lawns. Lawn maintenance items such as weed/crab grass control, dead trees and shrubs and edging as well as replenishing the mulch in your beds need to be continued throughout the year. Please do not leave grass clippings on the sidewalk and/or street.

Home Exteriors. Look at your home and inspect for peeling and blistering paint and rotted wood, staining and green algae. Please power wash and repaint all affected surfaces.

Play equipment. Outdoor play equipment must be approved by the Modifications and Construction Committee. Please obtain your approval before making any purchases. Remember, maintaining your property on a regular basis not only ensures that the standards of the community are preserved, but eliminates the need for violation notices, hearings and possible fines.

COMMUNITY SAFETY:

Please drive slowly and use caution as you drive through the community keeping an eye out for pedestrians and children. Observe yield, stop and speed limit signs; remind your children about the dangers of running and playing in the street and ask them to move out of the way of approaching vehicles.

Prince William County Police are making more frequent random visits within Lake Manassas and will take appropriate action to address speeding, running stop signs, use of unauthorized motorized vehicles and vandalism. Please obey stop signs and yield signs while driving in the community. There have been reports of near misses at the Spyglass Hill Loop circle due to driver's inattention to signs and approaching vehicles as well as damage to the common area due to speed and inattentive driving. To supplement regular police patrols, the Board is utilizing the County's Off Duty Police Patrol Program to patrol our streets, which is a "pay for" service. Please obey the laws of the road. Passing a stopped school bus constitutes reckless driving in Virginia and is punishable by up to 12 months in jail and/or a fine of up to \$2,500. We also ask that all residents report any suspicious activity to either the police or the management office depending on the time and nature of said activity. Let's all be on the lookout and keep Lake Manassas safe. Please contact gate attendants prior your guests arrival. To secure a temporary parking pass, contact the on-site manager.

STREET PARKING:

We understand that over the holidays, or when you are receiving guests, parking in the street may be necessary. It seems, however, that the issue of vehicles parked in the street on a regular basis is becoming a problem.

When you moved into the community, you were provided with documents containing the covenants, conditions and restrictions for the LMROA. The guidelines state that there is no street parking permitted without prior authorization of management. If you have room in your driveway then you should not have cars parked in the street. Understandably, for those who have multiple vehicles, rearranging cars to accommodate those who live in your home can be a nuisance, however, the parking rule was put in place to keep as many vehicles as possible off the roads for the safety and aesthetics of the community. If you or your guests require temporary street parking, please contact the on-site office for an approved parking pass. If you or your guests park a vehicle in the street without notice having been given to the on-site manager, the vehicle will likely be issued a warning notice on the windshield. The vehicle information is then forwarded to the on-site office and a violation letter is issued to the owner or owner sponsoring the guest vehicle in question. Violations may result in fines of \$50 for each occurrence. If you continually disregard the parking regulations, you may be called to a hearing before the Covenants Committee and fined for each infraction.

TRASH:

Our trash removal service is provided by American Disposal. Trash is collected weekly on Mondays and Thursdays, with recycling on Mondays and yard debris removal on Thursdays. A special pick up service is available for a fee (white goods, construction debris, etc.), but must be scheduled in advance. Please call American Disposal 703.368.0500 for details and scheduling. Reminder - please be sure not to set your trash out any sooner than the evening before collection (approximately 6 pm); trash cans and containers must be stored out of sight prior to sunrise the day after collection. This includes trash left by a landscaping company. When trash is put out a day or two before pick-up, the overall effect presents an unsightly appearance in our lovely neighborhood. On windy days, trash is easily blown down the street making the street and the community unsightly. Be a good neighbor and tie it down and please be sure to cover all trash.

• Inclement Weather: Roadway safety is our primary concern. Roads and/or areas, which are deemed unsafe due to snow or ice, will be suspended for collection. If we are unable to provide collection, services will resume as soon as it is safe to do so.

PETS: Pets must not be allowed to roam without a leash, urinate and defecate on private property. If you experience difficulty with a neighbors pet, you should speak to the neighbor about your concerns. If you feel you need to contact the authorities, you can call Prince William County Animal Control. After those options have been exhausted you may contact the on-site office and we will send a reminder of the Prince William County leash law and community guidelines for pets. Pets should not be allowed outside a confined area on your property without being controlled on a leash.

Please try to control your dog from barking excessively especially during the early morning and late evening hours. The on-site office regularly receives complaints regarding pets on private property. Always have your dogs leashed and do not let your cats roam the community.

COMMUNITY INFORMATION LAKE MANASSAS

Cats should be kept indoors and not allowed to wander onto neighboring properties. If you are concerned about cats on your property and do not know who they belong to, they may be feral (born to stray cats). In any case, if you experience problems with pets wandering onto your property, contact Prince William County Animal Control for advice or to report issues with neighborhood pets and/or feral cats.

LEASING A COMMUNITY PROPERTY:

All leases must be a minimum of 12 months in duration. A copy of the lease must be submitted to the management office before the tenant moves in. Without a copy of the lease, your tenants will not be issued vehicle decals, transponders or pool passes. Please have your tenants stop by the on-site office to pick up a copy of the Lake Manassas Homeowners Handbook and Welcome Package. Remember, tenants are subject to the same residential requirements as all homeowners however, you as the owner, are still responsible for your property. LMROA will contact you as the homeowner for any reconciliation, as needed. Short term leases and Airbnb's are not permitted in the Lake Manassas community.

COURTEOUS NEIGHBORS:

Please do not walk on private property which includes residents' lawns and the golf course. Please keep children and animals off the golf course. Golfers retrieving golf balls are allowed to walk in the resident's yards that back up on the golf course.

Noise Ordinance Times: The Prince William County noise ordinance is Monday through Friday from 10 pm until 6 am and on Saturday, Sunday and Holidays from 10 pm until 9 am. If you were to contact the police regarding what you consider to be an inappropriate time for unusually loud noises, they will come out and investigate. But first, speak to your neighbors to explain that the noise is disturbing to you.

Complaints: The on-site office regularly receives complaints on a variety of topics that most recently include:

- Cigarette butts and gum are both unsightly and hazardous to pets when disposed of improperly on the street and/or on private property;
- · Dogs barking and biting; Pets off leash and/or roaming and defecating on private property;
 - Neighbor's lawns not mowed or weeded properly;
 - Speeding;
 - · Vehicles running stop signs;
- RV's and/or boats brought into the community and left overnight and/or parked in dangerously in the street.

Management will address these issues as they arise, however some issues are best resolved neighbor to neighbor. We thank you in advance for following the County laws as well as the community rules and being a considerate neighbor.

FIREWORKS:

Fireworks are prohibited in Lake Manassas and [most] are in violation of Prince William County laws. Any incidents of unlawful fireworks will be reported to the Fire Marshal to investigate and take necessary action.


