ROM THE BOARD

Summer is here and the pool is open! Please check the website (www.lmroa.com) for hours of pool operation. We hope all residents enjoy the amenities at the Swim and Tennis Center this summer.

Our committees have been hard at work…below are updates on various committee activities. The Board would like to thank all our volunteers for their service and support. We encourage all residents to volunteer.

FINANCIAL UPDATE:

- **Budget & Finance Committee:** One of our newer residents to the Lake Manassas community, Harry Horning, has joined the Budget and Finance Committee. Thank you and welcome, Harry.
- **Current Financial Conditions:** Through April the Association is in a positive position of \$72,570. We estimate a break even or slight income by the close of the Fiscal Year, June 30, 2019.
- Owner's Equity: Our long-term goal is to achieve 20% Owner's Equity. We currently have a positive balance of \$111,914.72.
- **Bad Debt:** We have a very aggressive program in place for collection of payments. Currently we have a delinquency rate of 3.7% but we expect it to be reduced in the next 30-60 days. In some cases, owners who are not current with their assessments are restricted from using certain Association amenities.
- Reserves: At this time our Reserves are fully funded; our Reserve Study was updated this spring. As the
 community ages we have begun to mill and re-pave parking lots, trails and certain roads. These are major
 expenses for which we have planned. Our current financial position assures we have sufficient funds in place
 to maintain our current assets. We expect to spend funds in the near future on upgrading the pool facilities
 including restrooms and tennis courts. Also, the retaining wall in back of the Kamehameha townhouses is in
 the process of getting bids and approval from the County for replacement of the current wood retaining
 wall.
- HOA Assessments/2020Budget: By the time you get this issue of The Lake Manassas Connection, your July assessment will be due. An increase to the base assessment of \$3.00 per month was approved by the board due to results of the Reserve Study, escalations in contracts and inflation. There is no increase to the maintenance fees paid by pipe stem and townhome owners. The Board is very conscious of the costs to maintain our current assets (roads, pool complex, tennis and sport courts, building, etc.) and status as a "premier community" in Prince William County.

ACTIVITY SINCE APRIL 2019

- The LMROA Quarterly Board meeting was held June 13, 2019. The budget for FY 2020 was approved and copies were mailed out to members.
- The Covenant's Committee is working with the Modifications Committee to update the LMROA Design Guidelines/Use Restrictions handbook.
- The Modifications and Construction Committee has been very busy with applications for new construction
 and homeowner improvements. Please remember to submit your applications prior to starting work.
 Remember, no exterior modification is to be made without approval of the MCC; doing so may result in a
 covenants violation being assessed to your account.
- The CSVAC has made the speed radar sign operational at various locations throughout the community and data continues to be collected and analyzed. As part of a speed calming project, most speed bumps were replaced with humps and several new raised crosswalks/cart paths were installed. At the same time, some road work projects and trail repairs were made.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS (CONT.)

- The Swim and Tennis Committee meets regularly.
 We are in the final year of a three-year contract with
 Virginia Pools. The committee met in June to discuss
 the pool management contract renewal as well as
 possible recommendations for renovations to both
 the Men's and Ladies changing/restrooms.
- The Budget and Finance Committee completed its review of the Reserve Study and FY 2020 budget and continues to monitor our investments.
- The Communication's Committee needs volunteers. If you are interested, please contact Michelle at mwingo@cmc-management.com.

PLANNED ACTIONS FOR THE REMAINDER OF 2019:

- Ornamental iron structures flanking the stone columns next to the path at the Amsterdam Gate will be installed to mimic the look of the gate. The boulder on the path will be removed prior to installation.
- Tennis and Sport Court asphalt and lighting repairs
- · Streetlight post repairs/painting
- Installation of additional signs in some new locations and paint or repair older existing signs
- · Asphalt seal coating on Spyglass Hill Loop
- Retaining wall behind Kamehameha Place engineering plans under review

We would also like to thank all residents in the community for their valuable feedback in helping improve the Lake Manassas Community – a great place to live!

The purpose of the "Corner" is to provide Community Residents with information pertaining to the ongoing efforts of the Lake Manassas Association (LMA) Board. The LMROA is a member of that Board and based on recent meetings and other information exchanges the information below is our representative's attempt to keep the Community abreast of the LMA Board's activities and actions.

- LMA Capital Projects As mentioned in the previous edition of the Connection LMA has scheduled two major projects in the spring/summer that will improve the appearance of the Community. LMA plans to resurface the pavement from Lake Manassas Drive east and west to the Amsterdam and Stonewall Gates respectively by the end of the summer. The effort to complete a Landscape Plan on Baltusrol Drive continues and will most likely be at a pause until the early fall with replacement and new plantings.
- Walkers/Bikers Sidewalk Extension at Baltusrol Gate This project has been completed.
- LM Directional Sign at End of Lake Manassas Drive A new light has been installed to make the directional sign visable at night.
- Pond and Siltation Study LMA continues its efforts to find an acceptable vendor to complete the Study. As you may recall this study is to identify the origin of what is thought to be "excess" silt than in the past. It is thought to be caused by the run-off from the construction projects on Baltusrol Blvd.
- LIDL There is still no word from the corporation headquarters regarding their continued interest and or progress to build a store at the corner of Route 29 and Lake Manassas Drive.
- Cell Tower There has not been any contact with LMA from anyone regarding this action
- Parking on Baltusrol Blvd LMA has addressed the parking situation on Baltusrol Blvd in front of the Medical Rehab Facility and was informed that there are plans to add additional parking around the building. In the interim signs have been posted, pavement has been striped outlining parking spaces and Baltusrol Blvd north and south lanes have also been striped to assist drivers at night.

PLEASE REMEMBER that illegal fireworks displays are not permitted in Lake Manassas and are a violation of Prince William County ordinances.




NEW RECYCLING RESTRICTIONS

Recently Prince William County changed the guidelines for recyclable items. In response, American Disposal has provided the following:

THINKBEFORE YOUTHROWSM



Place all items mixed together & unbagged into your recycling container. Give some items a guick rinse.



MATERIALS ACCEPTED FOR RECYCLING

Plastics bottles and jugs: containers with necks including soda, water, juice, milk and detergent containers. Rinse out containers. Bottle caps may be replaced after rinsing.

No bottles that previously contained hazardous materials (such as oil, flammable materials, chemicals, etc.).

Aluminum and steel food and beverage cans and empty aerosol cans. Empty and rinse out cans.

Newspapers, magazines, catalogs, junk mail, office paper and paperboard boxes, such as cereal, cookie, cracker and tissue boxes. Cardboard (flattened and cut down to sizes up to 2 ft. X 2 ft. in size if taking to the drop-off trailers.) Please note: large boxes may be taken to the County Landfill or Balls Ford Road Compost Facility.

Do not include cardboard with food residue or plastic liners. Also please discard packing materials such as styrofoam, air pillows and bubble wrap.

WE DO NOT ACCEPT

Plastic bags - accepted at most grocery stores

Glass containers and jars, window glass, mirrors, light bulbs or ceramics

Plastics 3 through 7 (such as yogurt, margarine, and widemouthed containers and buckets, styrofoam, bubble wrap, air pillows, etc.)

There is no increase in the pipe stem or townhome maintenance fees in 2020. A copy of the FY 2020 budget was mailed to the membership at the end of May.

The speed calming measures in the form of raised crosswalks at most golf course crossings and at Turtle Point and Snead Loop have been completed. New signs and markings should be completed by early summer. The speed radar data continues to be collected at various locations and will be used to identify additional speed calming measures needed. The data will be reported in the Connection and recommendations made to the Board based on the data.

Please observe posted speed limit signs and come to a complete stop at all stop signs in the community. Random PWC police patrols will continue. Please report violations to the office with license plate numbers and vehicle identification if possible. Please do not call the gate houses as the attendants are there for entry control only.

The first Gate Attendant Award is scheduled to be completed in mid June and recommendation made to the Board. For award in July. Resident input will be one of the factors considered. Please provide Michelle with your experiences - positive or negative - regarding individual attendants performance.

Summer heat can take a toll on your lawn. If you mow too low, water too much or too little, or ignore early signs of problems, your grass can become lackluster or die in small or large patches. The consensus among experts is to:

- Leave your grass taller (no more than 6 inches), it shades soil which reduces water evaporation, leads to deeper roots and prevents weed seeds from germinating. Mow timely so as to never remove more than one-third of the leaf surface at a time.
- For the healthiest grass, water your lawn deeply and less frequently.
- Grubs are one of the most damaging types of lawn pests. Japanese beetles, June bugs, and European chafers lay eggs in early to midsummer and hatch into grubs in mid-to-late summer. Therefore, the best time to treat for them is late summer to early fall
- A dull mower blade tears grass and creates ragged, brown edges that provide an opening for disease organisms. The rule of thumb is that a blade lasts for 10 hours of mowing before needing sharpened or replaced.
- Warm-season grasses (bahia, bermuda, centipede, zoysia) do most of their growing in the summer when temperatures are between 75-90 degrees. In the fall they go dormant, turn brown, and won't green up again until spring. Fertilize them in early spring (after a mild winter) or late spring (after a cold winter).
- There are a number of different types and blends of coolseason grasses. As a general rule do not fertilize cool-season lawns during the summer, wait until fall/early spring to do so. Apply weed control in late summer/early fall. Do not apply a preemergent herbicide if you plan to seed or over seed.
- Summer activities can result in toys, water games, lawn chairs, and tools, among other things, being left on the lawn.
 Avoid harming or killing grass crowns by putting "stuff" away after use.

Now that shrubs are being trimmed and grass is being cut regularly, please remember that yard clippings are collected only on Thursdays and can be set out the evening before collection (Wednesdays after sundown).

During the spring and summer, the MCC typically sees the volume of applications submitted for review increase. If you are considering any alteration or improvement to the exterior of your home, you must first gain approval from the MCC. Meetings are typically held the second Monday of each month. Modification applications must be filed at least one week prior to a scheduled meeting to ensure committee review. Applications not received one week in advance will not be reviewed until the following month/ meeting.

It is important to note if you are in the process of selling your residence, association resale documents involve an inspection of your property to inform the buyer that all exterior modifications have been approved and conform to the design guidelines. It is in your best interest to submit an application for those changes which you have completed without Modifications Committee approval. Any modification not approved by the MCC will be cited as a violation and may complicate the sale of the property. The application is available on the community website as well as at the onsite office. Michelle can assist you with any questions you may have with the process.

The MCC along with the Covenants Committee, continues the review and update the Design Guidelines and will be submitting suggested updates and revisions to the Board of Directors soon.

In addition to reviewing homeowner applications for exterior modifications, the committee conducts monthly common area inspections between March and November and provides a written report to the board that includes recommended replacements/improvements. If there are areas of concern to you regarding common areas, please contact the site office so that an inspection by management and/or the MCC can be arranged.

The MCC generally meets on the second Monday of the month at 5:00 PM at the site office located at the Swim and Tennis Center on Turtle Point Drive. Occasionally the meeting date is rescheduled due to members' availability, so please check with Michelle or the community website ticker or calendar at www.lmroa.com.

The pool opened over Memorial Day weekend and was well attended! Pool hours are daily from 1 I am until 8pm, however during the last week of August when Prince William County Schools are back in session, weekday hours will be from 3 p.m. until 8 p.m. The pool closes for the summer at 8pm on Labor Day.

Virginia Pools will be managing our pool facilities again this summer. We are happy to welcome back some familiar faces since several of our lifeguards from previous years are returning this summer. Parents, please instruct your children who attend the pool without you that the lifeguard warnings should not to be questioned and advise them to adhere to pool rules. A copy of the pool rules can be found on the community website and are also posted on the bulletin board inside the pool gate.

Please be careful as you enter the pool facilities...no rollerblading, skateboarding or bicycles are to be ridden in the breezeway/pool gate entrance also, oversized floats are not permitted in the pool.

Some residents have requested to bring additional guests to the pool to celebrate events. Note that there is a 4 guest limit unless you receive prior authorization from the board.

Swim team practices have begun. The team practices weekdays before the pool opens and in the evenings from 6 to 7pm. There are several swim meets at the pool this summer, including Divisionals. The pool typically opens by 1pm after a meet (after the pool has been cleaned). Please check the website, www.lmroa.com for the meet schedule.

In order to comply with the Prince William County Noise Ordinance, anyone using the sport courts must exit the Swim and Tennis Center facility by 10pm. Lights on the sport courts are on a timer and shut off promptly at 10pm. Our gate attendants monitor the surveillance cameras at our facilities and will contact Prince William County Police to escort individuals from the premises after 10pm.

The Committee is investigating several options for court repairs or replacements as well as updates to the Men's and Ladies rooms and will make a recommendation to the Board of Directors soon.

The season is 26 weeks long and begins on Wednesday, April 17, 2019 and ends on Wednesday, October 9, 2019. The League registration/membership fee are \$75.00 per golfer. On play dates/days the cost (includes range balls and cart) for non-Cannon Club and Annual Membership golfers will be \$49.00. Cannon Club Members pay only \$45.00 and Annual Members are not required to pay-to-play. Golfers are not required to play every Wednesday; only when their schedule permits them to play.

Each Wednesday the golf begins at 8:30 AM with a "shotgun" start. Most play dates

are "Open Play" however the League will conduct a competitive event and "Play for Prizes" at least once each month except in April and October. During the year the League will also schedule Medal and Match Play Events and at the end of the season conduct The Rowe Cup using a Ryder Cup format with competing Teams.

During the season the golfers are divided into Flights based on skill. At the end of the season the League will host an Annual Awards Luncheon and present awards to golfers in each flight in a number of categories. To qualify for some of the awards a golfer must complete and post at least 13 individual 18-hole scores in the League at Stonewall.

There is one addition this year in the Preferred Tee choice options below to point out. This year the League will give golfers the opportunity to choose and play from a Combo Tee, a combination, a mix of White and Red Tee locations. From the Combo Tee

the par is 72; the course yardage is 5877 yards shorter than the White Tee (6191) yet longer than the Red Tee (5681) and the holes have been handicapped based on difficulty.

As the weather grows warmer, you may come across furniture in your home that you have grown tired of or perhaps the pieces no longer fit into your decor. Before you decide to donate the items or give them to a friend, consider chalk painting in order to give them new life.

For many years now, chalk painting has been a popular decorating trend. It was developed in 1990 by Annie Sloan. At that time, as a mother of three boys under the age of 7, she was looking to create a paint that provided immediate results for decorating. She also wanted a product that could more or less be used on anything, i.e., wood, metal, plastic, cement, etc.

Now over twenty five years later, the world of chalk paint has expanded from its original brand to numerous imitators. It is safe to say that since its creation, chalk paint has revolutionized the world of decorative painting. Perhaps the biggest reason for this is that chalk painting is relatively easy to do. The transformation that occurs in a rather short amount of time from one or two coats of paint is often short of amazing.

If you decide to try your hand at this popular decorating trend, here are some tips to consider that may make your life a little easier as you embark upon a new painting endeavor.

- There are so many different brands of chalk paint on the market. It is nice to have a wide range of choices, but it can be overwhelming. You may need to experiment with different brands before you settle on a favorite.
- You may purchase a brush that is recommended for chalk paint but it is not an absolute necessity. Rollers may also be used. Better quality brushes and rollers are recommended.
- The amount of preparation before painting varies from piece to piece. One of the upsides of chalk painting is that often the only preparation needed is a good cleaning to remove dirt, grime and grease from the furniture piece before painting. There are times, however, when sanding will make for a nicer finished product. Additionally, if a piece of furniture has a very dark stain on it, you may want to apply one or two coats of shellac before painting or you may get red stain bleeding through your paint finish.
- When painting is done, it is recommended that wax be applied to give the piece a protective finish. Often a combination of clear and dark wax is used to create an antique look. There is quite a difference between clear and dark wax so your choice of which to use depends on the type of look you desire. Whichever you choose, remember that it doesn't take very much wax to seal chalk paint so it should be applied sparingly. Since a thin coat is recommended, you only want the tip of your brush to be covered in the wax. Immediately use a clean cloth to wipe off the excess wax. You may want to scoop some wax onto a separate disposable plate or bowl and work from that, so you don't have to dip your brush directly in the wax and potentially contaminate it with paint or bristles.

It is now time to find a small, tired looking chair or table and treat it to a favorite color of chalk paint. The new piece will brighten up your home and possibly give you a new hobby for years to come!

creating a summer patio Herb Garden

As the weather becomes warmer and the days become longer, the outdoors beckon us to come out to explore, play and to perhaps even begin a new hobby or activity. A great activity to consider this summer is the creation of a container herb garden. Not only will the plants add beauty and aroma to your patio, they will also enrich your culinary life. Fresh herbs bring extra zeal to your meals and because they make foods taste fabulous, you may find yourself cutting back on extra salts, sugars, and oils. What a wonderful added benefit!

Before beginning, you must decide whether to begin with seeds or seedlings (young plants). Starting from seeds will require allowing enough time for seeds to germinate indoors. This usually requires anywhere between six and ten weeks. It is best to expose your plants to the outdoors

gradually. This process is called hardening off. To do this, place your plant in a protected outdoor location for one hour the first day. Continue to do this for about one week, adding an additional hour each day. Do not put them in direct sun during this process. After one week to ten days, your plant should be ready for the outdoors. If you decide not to begin with seeds, as the temperatures are now warmer, you can skip the above, indoor step, and simply go to your local store and purchase small herb plants.

Regardless of whether you begin with seeds or purchase a small plant from your local store, both plants are small at this point and

therefore may require repotting before you place them out on your patio. If purchased as a seedling from the store, be sure to repot the plant within one week. Be sure to use quality potting soil from a nursery or garden supply store when repotting your plants. The plant should not sit any deeper in the new pot than it was in the original container.

It is now time to select a container for your plant. With so many different types to choose from, it is important to consider a few things before selecting one. Plastic is lightweight and easy to move around but can deteriorate over time outdoors. Ceramic is durable and has endless designs to choose from but they can be heavy to move around. Finally, clay pots are simple and classic. Because they are porous, air and water are able to pass through the walls of the pot which helps to prevent root rot and problems caused by overwatering. Because water passes through, however, soil may dry out more quickly which may require more watering than plastic and ceramic containers.. Whatever pot you choose, make sure there are holes in the bottom so water can adequately drain.



The last consideration for choosing a pot is size and whether you will be placing plants in pots alone or pairing with other plants. A pot as small as 10 inches in diameter may be used for single herb plantings. Be careful not to choose an overly large pot because too much space for growth may result in the plant holding too much water which can lead to root rot. If you choose to pair plants together in one pot, you should choose a pot that is at least 18 inches in diameter.

At last you are ready to choose what herbs you would like to have in your container garden. You may want to start small and perhaps choose herbs that have similar growing needs. The following "full sun" varieties are popular choices. These include parsley, basil, rosemary, sage, basil, and thyme. The sun requirements for these herbs are similar, and include sun exposure for about 5

to 6 hours a day. You can decide to plant each herb singularly in a pot or plant them in pairs. That is the beauty of container gardening. Be mindful, however, of the watering needs for each if planting two different herbs together. Some require more water than others so make sure the plants are compatible if combining in one pot.

Summer is almost here, the days are warmer and the sun is shining. Your soon-to-be garden is beckoning you. With a little work, you will soon be snipping flavorful sprigs and flowering stems that will add delicious flavors to your culinary dishes. Enjoy the herbs of your labor!!



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COMMUNITY INFORMATION

COVENANTS INSPECTIONS:

While we understand that there are some aspects of property maintenance that cannot be attended to various times of the year (especially painting and landscaping), and in certain weather conditions, please do your best to keep your property maintained according to LMROA guidelines. If you are issued a violation notice and need an extension of time to complete repairs, please contact the on-site office by calling 703.753.7745.


The LMROA Community Handbook contains useful information covering Design Guidelines, Use Restrictions, Property Maintenance Standards and Enforcement Procedures. Please be sure to correct any violations that may exist on your property. If you need a copy of the most current Lake Manassas Handbook, please let us know and we will provide a copy to you at your request. Following is just a sample of a few important inspection items that need to be continuously maintained:

Mailboxes. Approved box color for the old style mailbox is hunter green and the post color is white or color matched to your existing post. If you need to replace your mailbox, contact Main Street Mailboxes at 703.753.5521. Please feel free to call the on-site management office with any questions at 703.753.7745.

Yards and Lawns. Lawn maintenance items such as weed/crab grass control, dead trees and shrubs and edging as well as replenishing the mulch in your beds need to be continued throughout the year. Please do not leave grass clippings on the sidewalk and/or street.

Home Exteriors. Look at your home and inspect for peeling and blistering paint and rotted wood, staining and green algae. Please power wash and repaint all affected surfaces.

Play equipment. Outdoor play equipment must be approved by the Modifications and Construction Committee. Please obtain your approval before making any purchases. Remember, maintaining your property on a regular basis not only ensures that the standards of the community are preserved, but eliminates the need for violation notices, hearings and possible fines.



COMMUNITY SAFETY:

Please drive slowly and use caution as you drive through the community keeping an eye out for pedestrians and children. Observe yield, stop and speed limit signs; remind your children about the dangers of running and playing in the street and ask them to move out of the way of approaching vehicles.

Prince William County Police make frequent random visits within Lake Manassas and will take appropriate action to address speeding, running stop signs, use of unauthorized motorized vehicles and vandalism. Please obey stop signs and yield signs while driving in the commu-

nity. You may notice our new electronic speed detection sign placed in various locations throughout the community. This will enable us to best identify areas where speeding occurs. To supplement regular police patrols, the Board is utilizing the County's Off Duty Police Patrol Program to patrol our streets, which is a "pay for" service. Please obey the laws of the road.

While incidences of vandalism or concerns about suspicious persons/activities are occasionally reported to us, **Prince William County Police should also be notified**. While we can pass your concerns onto our patrol officers, the association can not file a police report on behalf of residents.

STREET PARKING:

We understand that over the holidays, or when you are receiving guests, parking in the street may be necessary. It seems, however, that the issue of vehicles parked in the street on a regular basis is becoming a problem.

When you moved into the community, you were provided with documents containing the covenants, conditions and restrictions for the LMROA. The guidelines state that there is no street parking permitted without prior authorization of management. If you have room in your driveway then you should not have cars parked in the street. Understandably, for those who have multiple vehicles, rearranging cars to accommodate those who live in your home can be a nuisance, however, the parking rule was put in place to keep as many vehicles as possible off the roads for the safety and aesthetics of the community. If you or your guests require temporary street parking, please contact the on-site office in advance. If you continually disregard the parking regulations, you may be called to a hearing before the Covenants Committee and also fined \$50 for each infraction.

TRASH:

Our trash removal service is provided by American Disposal. Trash is collected weekly on Mondays and Thursdays, with recycling on Mondays and yard debris removal on Thursdays. A special pick up service is available for a fee (white goods, construction debris, etc.), but must be scheduled in advance. Please call American Disposal 703.368.0500 for details and scheduling. Reminder - please be sure not to set your trash out any sooner than the evening before collection (approximately 6 pm); trash cans and containers must be stored out of sight prior to sunrise the day after collection. This includes trash left by a landscaping company. When trash is put out a day or two before pick-up, the overall effect presents an unsightly appearance in our lovely neighborhood. On windy days, trash is easily blown down the street making the street and the community unsightly. Be a good neighbor and tie it down and please be sure to cover all trash. While we understand that trash bags at the curb, may be necessary from time to time, it is recommended that you use the can provided by American Disposal. This will eliminate any trash/debris scattered by birds and wildlife.

COMMUNITY INFORMATION

LEASING & COMMUNITY PROPERTY:

All leases must be a minimum of 12 months in duration. A copy of the lease must be submitted to the management office before the tenant moves in. Without a copy of the lease, your tenants will not be issued vehicle decals, transponders or pool passes. Please have your tenants stop by the on-site office to pick up a copy of the Lake Manassas Homeowners Handbook and Welcome Package. Remember, tenants are subject to the same residential requirements as all homeowners however, you as the owner, are still responsible for your property. LMROA will contact you as the homeowner for any reconciliation, as needed. Short term leases and Airbnb's are not permitted in the Lake Manassas community.

COURTEOUS NEIGHBORS:

Please do not walk on private property which includes residents' lawns and the golf course. Please keep children and animals off the golf course. Golfers retrieving golf balls are allowed to walk in the resident's yards that back up on the golf course.

Noise Ordinance Times: The Prince William County noise ordinance is Monday through Friday from 10 pm until 6 am and on Saturday, Sunday and Holidays from 10 pm until 9 am. If you were to contact the police regarding what you consider to be an inappropriate time for unusually loud noises, they will come out and investigate. But first, speak to your neighbors to explain that the noise is disturbing to you.

Complaints: The on-site office regularly receives complaints on a variety of topics that most recently include:

- Cigarette butts and gum are both unsightly and hazardous to pets when disposed of improperly on the street and/or on private property;
- Dogs barking and biting; Pets off leash and/or roaming and defecating on private property;
- Neighbor's lawns not mowed or weeded properly;
- Grass clippings not removed from street/sidewalk
- · Speeding and vehicles running stop signs;
- RV's and/or boats brought into the community and left overnight and/or parked dangerously in the street, on sidewalks or trails.

Management will address these issues as they arise, however some issues are best resolved neighbor to neighbor. We thank you in advance for following the County laws as well as the community rules and being a considerate neighbor.

COVENANTS PATROLS:
